Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year

Portman Arms/Woodentop Inn

Somerset Council have published revised plans for the erection of 6 dwellings and garages on land to the rear of the pub. Based on the planning applications of 2020 and 2023, it no longer includes any changes to the pub itself. See Round Robin for links at: east.chinnock@gmail.com

Portman Community Park

Cllr Taylor reported that the fence and gate have now been painted. One of the metal benches has also been painted. One of the fence panels is currently missing. There is also a fence post that has rotted at the bottom and needs replacing but it is uncertain who owns the post. The chain-link fence also needs some attention. It was decided to ask the ranger to fix this, and they also mend fences.

The Church Clock

Cllr Goodes has been in touch with Gillett & Johnston re repairing the Church clock and has asked them to re-quote given the original quote has now expired, and also to clarify some of the work quoted for. They have responded with a new quote of £8500 in total (almost double what was originally quoted). This was clearly much more than the PC was expecting to pay, and the PC is now considering an alternative supplier. Cllr Goodes has mentioned this to Gillett & Johnston in the hope that they might make their quote more competitive and is exploring the implications of potentially using another supplier for the War Memorials Trust Grant.

Rights of Way

Mr Bussel reported that Somerset Council have done a good job clearing the fallen trees on the area of footpath (above Orchardleigh), but have unfortunately now blocked the ditch / silt trap while doing this! It is hoped that they will return to clear it. Cllr Goodes has also asked what they are doing to clear the stumps blocking the silt trap (and is awaiting a response) and he has also reported the poor surface of Back Lane adjacent to 'The Rookery'.

FEOFFEES

Feoffees is the village poors' land Charity, which owns the Village Hall, Old School House and a field at the bottom of the village which is currently leased to the Seyfrieds of Broad Lane.

The Committee has representatives from the Church and the Parish Council as well as some independent bodies; funds are used for the benefit of the villagers of East Chinnock.

Currently, the Feoffees send vouchers to any villagers who have spent two nights in hospital, and to those who have been bereaved during the year.

They propose to also give vouchers to new parents in the village, and would be grateful for notification of any new arrivals.





East Chinnock WI

Villager Brian Kemp is known to many here as a local beekeeper and we enjoyed an evening of learning all about the little insects when Brian gave us a talk on **Wednesday 9 October.**

Brian has been keeping bees for 10 years and has had up to 6 colonies. Sadly, with the dreadful weather this year he was unable to produce any honey.

He described the differences between bees, bumble bees, wasps and hornets. There are 270 different types of bee! If you happen to see an Asian Hornet or a nest, this needs to be reported to a local beekeeper (there are 44,000 in the UK) or to The British BeeKeepers Association so that action can be taken urgently as they are potentially very dangerous to the survival of our native bees. Asian Hornets can be differentiated from the European Hornet quite easily - Asian Hornets have a black head a single yellow stripe at the base of their abdomen, the European Hornet is more colourful



It takes 12 bees in their short lifetimes to make a teaspoon of honey. 80% of the produce we consume is pollinated by bees. We need to look after our little buzzy friends



We had a really entertaining evening at WI in the Village Hall on **Wednesday 13 November**. Local Morris Dancer Pip Oxenbury came and gave us a talk about his long involvement with Morris Dancing and a demonstration, ably assisted by four brave volunteers.

Morris Dancing appears to have been around since the days of Henry VIII. The term "Morris" is derived from "Moorish", although Morris Dancing has no known historical connection to the Moors.

Extracts from 'Somerset Remembers' Compiled by Somerset Federation of Women's Institutes, published 1978

Recollections of Country People - East Chinnock

An unusual feature of the village is the number of natural springs, the rights of which were reserved to Lord Portman when the estate was sold in the early 1900s. The springs were the only source of water supply until mains water was installed. A number remain and one is still the sole source of supply to one of the farms. Owing to redevelopment the course of some springs has been interfered with and diverted.

In olden days the village was closely knit to agriculture and boasted a wheelright and carpenter's shop, a cider house where the cider press wheel was turned by a horse, a bakery renowned for its Easter Cakes and Gingerbread, a blacksmith, and lace and glovemaking in the cottages.

The village men were chiefly agricultural workers. The wives and daughters worked machines making gloves and taking them to the Yeovil factories, their houses were spotless. The houses are built of local stone from Ham Hill. The front gardens each side of the road had lilac, snowball and chainey (laburnam) trees. Now because of traffic the gardens are half as wide and the trees are gone. Everyone knew each other and famillies intermarried; only six families were not related.

The excitement of the first motor through the village was wonderful. If and when one came through during school hours, we were allowed to go into the yard and watch it and then back to lessons.

The Church is Perpendicular and was built in 1091. It has many interesting features not the least five stained glass windows which were given and installed after World War II by a German ex-Prisoner of War as a token of thanks to the farmers ad villagers for their kindness to him. The German and his family have returned to the village on a number of occasions and always telephones the farmer each Christmas Day to send compliments to friends.

In bygone days the highlight of the year was the annual Friendly Society Club walk. It started with a service at the Church and then with banners unfurled the members walked around the village enjoying dancing and refreshments at several houses before adjourning for a lunch for the men and a tea for the ladies. A Women's Club was held on the Wednesday of Whit week, all dressed in white with pink belts and the Men's Club on Thursday wearing blue rosettes. Charlie Axe carried the large banner each day, headed by South Petherton Band called "Star of the West". Outside the Portman Arms two stalls were erected to sell cakes, sweets and various china articles. There were swing boats, round-a-bouts and coconut shies and everybody enjoyed themselves. Recently the Harvest Supper has been revived when villagers spend a jolly evening together celebrating the Gathering of the Harvest, which, despite many people having left the land to work in neighbouring towns, is still a vital part of our heritage.

The Halves Lane Jubilee Pavilion hosted our Annual Dinner on October 5th, where we enjoyed catering by Dorset Delights and music from Used Notes. We were able to celebrate our many achievements on and off the pitch and give thanks to our volunteers, from committee members, to coaches, team leaders, groundstaff and of course the delicious cricket teas! Thanks also to New Inn, Royal Oak, Saunders Butchers and Somerset CCC for their generous raffle prizes.

After Sophie Witcher's 'Growing The Game' award at the County Ground (pictured with Somerset CCC CEO Jamie Cox), it was fitting that she had the floor first, reflecting on the inaugural season of Women's cricket at Halves Lane and the comaraderie among the group of nearly 20 players, many of whom were new to the game. The team ended the season with a respectable 5th in the Gibson Softball Pairs League.

Our Junior Section continues to thrive, and the success of our Friday night All Stars and Dynamos programme has seen numbers of 5-11 year olds grow to nearly 40 over the last couple of years. This success has enabled us to start junior teams representing West Coker & Hardington, with both U10 and U12 age groups now playing competitive cricket.

Our Sunday team, The Panthers, are now in their 2nd season at Halves Lane and they now have a solid core of players looking for more than just friendlies. As a result they have applied to join the Mid Wessex League which will hopefully bring competitive cricket to Halves Lane on Sundays.

Will Brooks continued to run his mid-week team and is always looking to welcome players who want to enjoy a bit of social cricket and work up a thirst (not necessarily in that order!)

Our Saturday Somerset Cricket League (SCL) team were hampered by the poor drainage at Halves Lane early in the season, and had 4 out of 9 home games cancelled. This robbed us of opportunities to secure more points and as result we finished 3rd from bottom. We will be playing in SCL Div. 5 South next year, but hope to bounce straight up!

We also hosted several events for the Somerset Cricket Foundation, including boys and girls tournaments for teams from South Somerset and sessions for Super 1's disability cricket. There has been great feedback from organisers and parents, praising



our facilities, hospitality and warm welcome.

Finally, 2025, is an important year as we celebrate 50 years as a Club, starting in Hardington next to The Royal Oak in 1975 and then moving to West Coker and Halves Lane 3 years later. We will be planning a few key events during the summer, once we know our fixtures, and of course welcome anyone interested in becoming a club member or sponsor.
