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

A volunteer has now come forward to help install and remove the Speed Indication Device (SID) from the two locations on the A30 when necessary (fortnightly). This is the third person to kindly volunteer, which means the Parish Council will now be able to go ahead and purchase the SID and keep ongoing costs to a minimum. (The purchase of the SID is still awaiting Avon and Somerset Constabulary's decision on whether a grant is available to help fund the purchase. It is also awaiting SID posts to be installed be contractors).





WI Update

Cocktail Tasting



A slightly boozy evening was had at WI on 13 December where mixologist Michelle Clarke talked to us about the history of cocktails. We were given a couple of cocktails to taste plus some hints and tips on how to improve an unwanted

bottle of gin if given as a present!

Cocktails have been around for much longer than you might think - with early concoctions dating back as far back as 4000 BC in Mesopotamia where fermented beverages mixed with herbs and spices were consumed for their purported medicinal properties.



Distillation originates from the Middle Ages with spirits like brandy



and gin becoming popular ingredients used in cocktail experimentation. A New York newspaper first used the word "cocktail" in 1806 while describing it as "a combination of spirits, sugar, water and bitters." During the prohibition era in the US (1920-1933), cocktails became popular choices to mask inferior-tasting bootleg liquor. Fast-forward to the 1980s and

cocktail bars popped up in every town. I am sure many of us enjoyed a "happy hour" at one of these.

In the 1700s, gin joints allowed women to drink alongside men for the first time and it is thought this led many women neglecting their children and turning to prostitution, hence gin becoming known as "Mother's Ruin".

Gin was first distilled in Holland in the 16th century. The Dutch word for 'juniper' is "jenever", which got Anglicised to "ginever" and then finally to "gin". Therefore, the phrase "Dutch courage" makes a lot of sense.

We were treated to a Mojito first of all (100ml Funkin Mojito mix, 50ml Barcardi). Mint leaves were handed around and we were asked to 'clap' the mint leaves before adding to the drink, which gave the drink a much better flavour than if you just put it in without 'clapping' it.

This was followed by a Bramble Gin Fizz (100ml Funkin Bramble mix, 50ml Gordons Gin) and an added blackberry. For extra fizz, Prosecco was added. Very nice!

If you're ever given a bottle of gin you don't like, you can make it more palatable by adding lemonade and prosecco.

It was a fun evening comparing our Christmas Hats too!





William Dampier

The WI talk on 10 January was about William Dampier. That name rings a bell doesn't it? Of course! It's the name of the Wetherspoons Pub and Restaurant in Yeovil town centre! Val and Chris Barker from Dawe's Twineworks in West Coker gave us an interesting insight into his life.

He was an English navigator, explorer, privateer, (some might say "pirate"), buccaneer and writer (A New Vovage Round the World 1697) who lived from 1651 to 1715. He was born in East Coker where there is a memorial to him in All Angels Church.

If you were asked who discovered Australia, you'd probably answer "Captain James Cook", but it was in fact William Dampier some 80

years beforehand when it was called New Holland. Dampier made many detailed observations of local wildlife and named the area 'Sharks Bay' in recognition of the large number of sharks in the area. He also made the first scientific collection of Australian plants.

He made several expeditions during his life-time and he was among the first to identify and name a number of plants, animals, foods, and cooking techniques for a European audience. He was one of the first English writers to use words such as "avocado", "barbecue", and



"chopsticks". In describing the preparation of avocados, he was the first European to describe the making of guacamole, named the breadfruit plant, and made frequent documentation of the taste of numerous foods foreign to the European palate at the time.

Dampier's other claims to fame included him being the first person to circumnavigate the globe 3 times and he was the inventor of wind maps. He made important contributions to navigation, collecting for the first time data on currents, winds and tides across all the world's oceans that was used by James Cook.

He certainly sounded a fascinating character. How many 16-year olds would walk out of their farmhouse in East Coker and walk to Weymouth looking to explore the world?
