

#### MEETING OF EAST CHINNOCK PARISH COUNCIL HELD ON MONDAY 7th APRIL 2025 IN THE VILLAGE HALL

Before the meeting commenced there was an opportunity for the public to speak:

A parishioner asked if there was any further news of the section 215 notice for the Wooden Top Inn.

The Chairman replied that the section 215 notice ended in November, and that enforcement was now in place for this order, but this usually takes a very long time. The Chairman has written to the owner, asking if they would consider tidying-up the car-park area, but there was no response.

Unfortunately, there is little else the Parish Council can do. Cllr Hewitson agree to see if there is any further progress on the Section 215 enforcement.



#### Council to update road closure order for Chinnock Hollow

A permanent road closure notice is being issued by Somerset Council to ensure the continued safety of the public at a

Chinnock Hollow near Yeovil was closed in February 2021 after being severely impacted by a significant landslide involving 20 tonnes of rock and sand, as well as a large tree. This followed a less serious incident just a week earlier.

A specialist geological survey identified the substantial risk of another serious landslide which meant the road was kept closed under a temporary Traffic Regulation Order (TRO).

At this time, the major funding required in order to safeguard the road and allow it to reopen is not available, so the Council needs to apply for a permanent TRO to replace the temporary one. The Council remains committed to exploring all potential sources of funding and is continuing to lobby for transport investment in the area. The TRO can be reversed in the future should funding become available.

Somerset Council's Lead Member for Transport and Waste, Councillor Richard Wilkins said: "Nothing has changed -Chinnock Hollow remains unsafe for vehicles, pedestrians or cyclists, but we need to move to a proper legal position.


However, we are continuing to lobby for transport investment in our county, when funding streams become available we will lobby strongly on behalf of the local communities."

#### Room @ the Park -The redecoration is complete!

The Room @the Park is getting ready for summer!

After the Room was handed back to St Marv's when the playgroup closed, volunteers from across the village worked hard to transform the garden and begin refurbishing the Room. Thanks to a generous donor in the village, all the windows were replaced and a new electric heater installed. Leaks were repaired and the repainting began, inside and outside.



And now, thanks to the generosity of another village resident, a professional painter and decorator, has completed the interior painting, and the restored Room is now ready for summer.

If you were in the village at the time, you'll remember the guestionnaire St Mary's distributed to every household, inviting suggestions for using the Room. Ideas included a café, pub, and social events space. Since then, the Room has become home to the Saturday Morning Café, monthly Men's Breakfast, as well as evening events like the Carol Singing last Christmas.

After the painting was finished, the Saturday Café was the first village activity hosted in the Room, followed by the WI VE Day celebrations on May 8th and then Men's Breakfast will be back in the Room at 8.30 on

Saturday May 17th, for bacon butties and putting the world to rights!

Then and Now Village Hall



Photograph of the village taken before World War II from the top of the Church tower, and a recent shot of the same view.

The top photograph shows Old Court Farm before its conversion into Portman Court and the land on which Spring Cottage now stands. There are some buildings in front of the "Portman Arms" pub, and a huge tree, all of which have now gone, and the photograph also shows the A30 road before it was widened in 1940. Land was compulsorily purchased from "The Gables" and "Courthayes" (then known as Court House, previously "The Laurels") to enable this to happen, and the front walls of the two houses were rebuilt further back. In the case of "The Gables" the sum paid for the land was £75!

"The Gables", a guest house at this time, had been the village bakery until 1919 and a small lean-to extension housing an oven in the end wall had to be demolished to make way for the wider road.

#### Reviews

**At the Wi meeting on 9 April**, we were joined by Patricia Perry for a talk on 'Being A Magistrate'.

Patricia is a retired Magistrate - also known as a Justice of the Peace. She was sworn in in 1977. We learned that Magistrates are often volunteers who go through extensive training to become a lower-level judicial officer who handles minor legal matters like speeding, drink-driving, theft, domestic violence, small claims, and may also issue search warrants or arrest warrants. There are approximately 21,000 Magistrates in the country.

She told us that Magistrates have to take an oath to serve without "favour, affection, malice, or ill will" and to always remember the victim when taking cases. A Magistrates Court will hear 95% of all criminal cases - the definition of which is "if it breaks the law, that's criminal" and is all evidence-based.

The difference between the various types of court were explained: Crown Court handles serious cases needing greater punishments like rape, possession of bladed weapons and paedophiles. Civil Courts hear about agricultural problems and if money is owed. Family Courts oversee mediation and divorce cases (where the child's welfare comes first).

Thank you to everyone who supported the Afternoon Tea held at the Room @ The Park on Thursday 8 May in celebration of the 80th Anniversary of VE Day.

Guests were treated to tea, sandwiches, cakes and scones (with options of jam on first OR cream on first!) whilst 1940s music played in the background. Most people arrived wearing red, white and blue adding to the joyful atmosphere.

There was a mini WW2 exhibition to which several villagers donated personal items (thank you!) and covered The Blitz, Evacuation, Active Service, The Land Army, Life During WW2 and The Home Guard.

There was also a display showing one week's typical adult ration of bacon, mincemeat, milk sugar, tea, cheese, butter and lard. It was quite humbling to see it laid out and to see what small amounts there were.

Ted Tierney said a few words of thanks. There was a lovely atmosphere in the room and I hope everyone who came enjoyed it.

I'm very happy to report that we have raised £235 for the Royal British Legion and this will be donated to the local branch at Crewkerne.


