He said: "We had all these cars lined and just kind of left there, we had to do something with them so we got this idea. We went down there and moved them all around, we had no idea what it was going to turn out like but it's turned out better than we thought it would. It was nice to be able to do something a bit different - I'm sure people who come past on the road think it looks like a bit of a mess now but when you see it from above you see what we were trying to do."

John also said he was inspired to do something to honour the NHS after a good friend was admitted to intensive care with the Covid-19 virus. The friend recovered from the virus and was released from hospital, leaving John in awe of the NHS's work and wanting to thank them. "They're doing a marvellous job - I know we've sadly lost plenty of lives in this but they've saved many, many more." "It's not just hospital staff either - it's all the way down to your local doctor and health visitors."

He added: "I think this situation has shown us they need to be well-respected, and the NHS needs to be remembered when this is over as well - the budgets need to be protected by the government."

He said: "The NHS is always appreciated but with these times, it's really come to the fore."

EDUCATION GUIDANCE - GOVERNMENT PROPOSALS REGARDING SCHOOLS



From the week beginning 1 June, and conditional on the national COVID 19 situation, the Government is proposing that mainstream provision is extended to include early years settings, all primary school pupils in reception, Year One and Year Six as part of a staged return to school. The proposals also include the provision of face-to-face contact for pupils in Year 10 and 12.

Children of key workers and vulnerable pupils will continue to be given priority.

Please note early years settings are being asked to open to all children but must carry out a risk assessment to ascertain how many children they can safely accommodate at any one time. Settings may therefore reduce the numbers of children they can safely care for and where this is the case priority will be given to 3 and 4 year-olds in the first instance.

Similarly, it may be that, because of specific circumstances, not all schools will be able to offer full time provision to the year groups set out in the government guidance. Head teachers will be contacting parents and carers to advise what provision they will be able to make.

Each educational setting is different, and we all need to support the professionalism and judgement of education leaders who will be making difficult decisions over the next few weeks and months. based on the context of their setting and community.

The government is also proposing the return of all primary school pupils, if possible, for up to a month before the beginning of the summer holidays. Further details to come.



SUPPORT FOR THE SELF-EMPLOYED

The Self-Employed Income Support Scheme is now open for applications. Grants will be calculated as 80% of average monthly profit over a period of up to three years, with a maximum payment of £7,500 which is intended to cover March, April and May.

Money will be paid into the accounts of eligible people six days after applying. Eligible people have been given a date from when they can claim between 13 and 18 May.

DOG POO PROBLEM - STOP BAGGING IT AND LEAVING IT ON THE ROAD

The issue of dog mess in and around the local area has increased over the past few months. Despite previous pleas for owners to do the right thing and pick it up, it would appear that some owners think that they are above the law.

It is not acceptable nor is it legal to allow your dog to defecate in a public place without picking it up! It is a hazard to livestock, it is a health hazard to children and not very pleasant if you happen to walk it into your house. In addition, with the increase in walking locally due to lockdown, there has been an increase in people bagging the poo and leaving it in bushes and hanging on bushes. Please do not do this!

The law is very clear: You must pick up after your dog. Failure to do so will result in a fine of up to $\underline{$ £1000}.

The dog warden has been informed of the problem and has placed some signs in prominent places. They will also be making random visits to the village in an attempt to catch the individuals concerned.

Anyone who sees this offence taking place should report it to the dog warden and if possible obtain photographic evidence of the dog doing its business.

A word of caution regarding taking photographs: try not to photo-graph the owner as under GDPR rules you need permission from the individual to do this. A photograph of the dog should be sufficient to identify the owner, as we all know which dogs belong to whom in the village. It's not a pleasant thing to do but if you own a dog you have a moral and legal responsibility Please be responsible dog owners, and do the right thing! Paul Taylor

A MESSAGE FROM THE PARISH COUNCIL

Dear all,

In the last issue of the Chimes we were facing the start of the current lockdown in order to prevent the spread of Covid19 and at that time I asked who would like help and would be willing to help.

As it turned out a good number of you wanted to help and I would like to thank all those that volunteered, we have been able to help a number of people in the village with shopping and prescriptions and will continue to do so until we return to some semblance of normality.

Some of the more observant of you will notice that some households are displaying green card in their windows, this is a method of quickly checking that the occupants are okay, if the card turns red then they need help with something. To date there have only been two instances of red cards and these were sorted out very quickly.

It was nice to see that the existing organisations and social circles in the village very quickly organised themselves to be able to keep in contact and look out for each other.

The village has so far managed to remain infection free, in order to maintain that I would encourage you all to continue what you're doing, follow the governments advice, don't go out unless absolutely necessary, maintain social distancing if you have to go out and wash your hands when you return home. If we continue to observe these rule we will get to the end of this infection-free and that will be a great achievement for East Chinnock.

You will notice that the play area has remained locked and will remain so until we are told that play areas may be used again. There is a subtle difference between a play area and a park and what we have is definitely a play area, a park is somewhere you can walk for exercise whilst still maintaining social distancing.

Some may argue that we should open the field side only to allow family groups to play football or even just to sit on the grass, to do so would be to send mixed messages, we would still have to keep the play equipment taped off and the youngsters wouldn't understand why they cannot use it.

The parish council have a duty of care to the entire community and to jeopardise what we have achieved so far for the sake of a few more weeks would be foolish, so I ask that you remain patient and the play area will be open as soon as we are allowed to do so.

Keep safe, keep to the guidelines and keep your distance. Paul Taylor





Eleven recycling sites will reopen on Monday 11 May for essential visits only To ensure social distancing, protect public and staff and limit numbers, there will be a range of temporary restrictions; queues and delays are likely.

Government guidance states visits should only take place if waste cannot be stored safely at home without risking harm or illhealth, or harm to public health and amenity.

If not an essential journey, please wait until sites are back to normal. Delays are likely. Recycling sites open from 11 May: Bridgwater, Chard, Dulverton, Frome, Highbridge, Street, Taunton, Wellington, Wells, Williton and Yeovil. (Other sites due to reopen from Tuesday 26 May.)

All will be open six days a week: 9am-6pm on Mondays, Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Fridays, 9am-4pm Saturdays and Sundays; all closed Thursdays.

Access is "one in, one out", a number plate system will be used:

Odd numbers only Mondays, Wednesdays, Saturdays Even numbers only Tuesdays, Fridays and Sundays.

There are restrictions on what you can leave at the site, so please visit www.somersetwaste.gov.uk to see the full list.



FIDGET THE CAT... A REMARKABLE STORY OF LOST AND FOUND BY A. WHELAN

In 2005 my dad received a terminal diagnosis of pancreatic cancer and was given 6 months to live. At the time he had a smallholding in North Devon where he lived with my stepmother Jane. As well as a small market garden, they kept ponies, chickens, ducks, and a family of farm cats.

The most recent addition were two kittens, 'Fidget' and 'Gromit'. Gromit was a pure farm cat through and through and lived to hunt. Fidget liked cuddles. Having received his diagnosis, my father decided to sell up and downsize. The ponies went to local breeders, the machinery was auctioned and the farm sold. The only animals that could not be easily rehomed were Fidget and Gromit.

At the time I was renting a flat in Somerton in a large country house where they held weddings. Although my contract made no allowance for pets, I asked my landlords whether it would be possible in the circumstances for the kittens to come and live with me. Taking pity, the landlord agreed on the proviso that they were 'good' cats.

Things went well for about 6 months. It was now 2006 and the cats would come and go through my kitchen window. Fidget would spend most of his days in the flat and Gromit would roam, and so we settled.

That was until one evening when there was a knock on the door. I opened it to find my landlord holding a birdcage with Gromit inside. She informed me that the white doves which they kept and released at the end of the weddings had been steadily declining in numbers recently. This had been a mystery until that evening when she had caught Gromit in the act. She informed me that 'they would have to go'.

So, just before he died, my dad used his contacts to find a farm just outside Bristol for them to go to. I packed them up and took them over the next day, feeling guilty that one of the last things he did for me was to rehome the cats he had asked me to take on. With the benefit of hindsight, I wished that I had moved to a new house instead.

Roll forward to April 2020. I am scrolling through my social media feeds when I see a post for 'Bristol pets lost and found'. It reads "According to his microchip, this dear old boy is called 'Fidget', is at least 15 years old and has previously lived in Somerton. He is in a very poor state". The picture shows a very dishevelled, emaciated cat but undoubtedly it is 'my' Fidget. Various people have commented to say that they had seen him wandering the area and that he'd been a stray for at least 2 years. I contacted them to say that he'd been my cat 14 years prior to that and that he'd been rehomed to a farm outside Bristol but that unfortunately I couldn't recall exactly who with or where now.

The vets where he was being looked after said that they'd found the vets he was registered with but that he hadn't been seen there for 10 years and that they were unable to trace or contact any other keepers. Given that they had looked after him for a couple of weeks, nobody had come forward for him and that his microchip was still in my name, they asked if I would rehome him.

The answer was obvious and instant. I collected him soon after. On the way home I phoned my stepmum, Jane, to tell her the news. It was her birthday week and through her tears she said it was the best birthday wish she could ever have hoped for.

So, 14 years later, Fidget is 'home'. I had never appreciated what the term 'skin and bones' really meant until I collected him. He is slowly putting on condition but at the same time clearly not in great health. I know we may not have him with us for a long time, but hopefully we can give him the retirement he deserves for the time he has left. **Andrew**
