The redevelopment of The Octagon Theatre had been given the go ahead.

#### **County Councillor's Report**

No report for this meeting.

#### **Clerk's Report**

The District and County Councils continue to provide assistance and information on the Covid situation and the village volunteers were still available if needed.

The clerk said that she had been asked if the backing on the noticeboard at the village hall could be renewed. Cllr Cox proposed with Cllr Smith seconding that Cllr Bussell, who had fitted the original backing, be authorised to order the necessary material

The picnic bench at the Lookout Point had been vandalised and Cllr Bussell said that he thought it was beyond repair. He had taped it off but someone had removed the tape and caused further damage. He felt that it now needed to be removed as it was not safe. Cllr Paul Taylor said that Nick Weber's quad bike and trailer had been used to take it up there and it was agreed to ask him if it was available to remove it. Cllrs Paul Taylor, Cox and Bussell said they would meet at The Lookout Point after the Play Area meeting on Saturday to dismantle the bench. The clerk said that she would report the vandalism to the Police and check with the Insurers to see if it was covered. She said that the company the bench had been bought from was no longer trading. Cllr Bussell said that he had found an identical bench at another company but had been unable to contact them so assumed that they had probably gone bust as well. It seemed unlikely that anywhere would be found to buy parts but he thought that it may be possible to salvage some parts to make a bench for the Play Area. Cllr Paul Taylor said that he would write an article for the next edition of The Chimes about the vandalism and it was suggested that the East Chinnock Round Robin be told as well. Cllr Reeve said the bench was well used and suggested that a wooden replacement would be better.

#### Lockdown Road Map from 17 May

There are a number of changes to the rules so we thought it might be useful to summarise them for you below:

- You should continue to work from home if you can. When travelling within the UK, you should aim to do so safely and plan your journey in advance.
- Outdoor gatherings will be limited to 30 people and indoor gatherings will be limited to 6 people or 2 households • (each household can include a support bubble, if eligible).
- New guidance on meeting friends and family will emphasise personal responsibility rather than government rules. Instead of instructing you to stay 2m apart from anyone you don't live with, you will be encouraged to exercise caution and consider the guidance on risks associated with Covid-19 and actions you can take to help keep you and your loved ones safe. Remember the risks of close contact may be greater for some people than others and in some settings and circumstances, there will be specific guidance you will need to follow even when you are with friends and family.
- Indoor entertainment and attractions such as cinemas, theatres, museums and children's indoor play areas will be permitted to open with Covid-secure/capacity measures in place.
- Indoor hospitality venues such as restaurants, pubs, bars and cafes can reopen.
- Organised indoor sport will be able to take place for all (this includes gym classes). This must be organised by a • business, charity or public body and the organiser must take reasonable measures to reduce the risk of transmission.
- All holiday accommodation will be open (including hotels and B&Bs). This can be used by groups of up to 6 or 2 households (each household can include a support bubble, if eligible).
- The rules for care home residents visiting out and receiving visitors will change, allowing up to five named visitors (two at any one time), provided visitors test negative for Covid-19.
- All higher education students will be able to access in-person teaching. No masks in secondary schools.
- There will no longer be a legal restriction or permitted reason required to travel internationally. There will be a traffic light system for international travel

If you are meeting friends in a park or an outside setting, ensure you keep your distance as our message remains - stay local, minimise travel and continue to follow 'hands, face, space and fresh air' to minimise catching Covid-19 and spreading it to others - even if you have been vaccinated. Transmission rates are highest in enclosed spaces so ensure the rule of 6 is understood and adhered to - we have come so far and we really need to keep up the good work. The final step of the road map is scheduled for 21 June. Somerset Coronavirus Support Helpline: A single phone number continues to be available for anyone in Somerset who needs Coronavirus-related support. 0300 790 6275, is open seven days a week from 8am to 6pm.

Somerset County Council has partnered with local employers to offer 50 six-month work placements through the Kickstart Programme, and the vacancies are now live.

#### Jane's South West Coastal Path Walking Challenge

Jane LeFeuvre has been undertaking a walking challenge to raise money for the Royal National Lifeboat Institution.

Here are the latest updates on her progress:

#### 7 April

Over the past 2 months I have walked the equivalent of the Dorset section of the South West Coastal Path, exploring the route as I went, via Abbotsbury, Ferrybridge, the Isle of Portland, Weymouth, Lulworth Cove and Swanage, to the finish point today at South Haven Point. The 630 mile walk has been an interesting and varied journey from start to finish, giving me an insight into lots of places I would like to visit when circumstances allow. It has also given me further insight into the lifeboat stations that serve the communities along the path, the challenges of life for RNLI volunteers and their families and the courage with which the volunteers carry out their roles supported by their families and the wider public.

I would again like to say a huge thankyou to everybody who has supported my 2 climbing/walking challenges. Your support has kept me walking through 3 lockdowns and long periods of shielding, through spring, summer, autumn, winter, and into spring again and helped raise the fantastic sums of £1,200 for NHS Charities Together and over £950 for the RNLI.

#### 14 April

Having recharged my batteries and determined to continue daily walking, I have challenged myself to walk 100 miles in 100 days and give £100 at the end to a cancer charity/charities. Having researched various walks around the country, I have decided to walk the equivalent of the Cotswold Way (102 miles), researching the route as I go and `i look forward to enjoying this new challenge as we gradually emerge from the hibernation of the long lockdown over the winter.

Thank you again for helping me with my fundraising.
