If you'd like to invite Jesus to live in your heart,

Chocolate Easter Egg Nests

Ingredients

- 225g plain or milk chocolate, broken into pieces
- 2 tbsp golden syrup
- 50g butter
- 75g cornflakes
- 36 mini chocolate eggs

Method

- 1. Line a 12-hole fairy cake tin with paper cases.
- 2. Melt the chocolate, golden syrup and butter in a bowl set over a saucepan of gently simmering water (do not let the base of the bowl touch the water). Stir the mixture until smooth.
- 3. Remove the bowl from the heat and gently stir in the cornflakes until all of the cereal is coated in the chocolate.
- 4. Divide the mixture between the paper cases and press 3 chocolate eggs into the centre of each nest. Chill in the fridge for 1 hour, or until completely set.



Recipe Tips
Shredded wheat or puffed rice cereals can be used instead of the cornflakes.



Choose a potato, and your coloured paints.

Ask a grown up to help you cut the potato in half, then cut a pattern in one half of the potato. This could be stripes, spots or zig zags — an old fashioned potato peeler could be good for creating spots. Just use the pointy end.

Next squirt a few blobs of paint onto a plate – about the size of a ten pence piece.

Take a brush and carefully paint the colours onto the cut side of your potato – this will work best if your potato is slightly dryer so you could try blotting it on a piece of kitchen paper first.

Now the really fun bit. Carefully put the painted side of your potato onto a piece of paper – taking care not to move it around otherwise the image will be fuzzy, then just as carefully peel it off.

You should have a picture of a patterned Easter egg.

Leave your pictures to dry then you could cut them out and use them to decorate cards or as gift labels or simple punch a hole in them, thread a piece of ribbon through the hole and after tying them on hang them up.



You will need –

potatoes
knife/potato peeler
paint
plate
brushes
paper towel
paper and card
ribbon or string








Why do we celebrate new life at Easter? Christians believe that on the third day after Good Friday – when Jesus died on the cross – He came back to life. The tomb where he'd been put was empty. Easter eggs help us remember the empty tomb, and as a chick breaks out of its shell when it's time to be born, it reminds us of Jesus breaking out of the tomb into new life. The eggs and the little chick remind us of the new life of Jesus. When Jesus becomes

our friend he lives in our hearts, we can

have a new life with him.


Here's a picture you can colour

Thank you Jesus


That you really are the most amazing 'Super Hero' ever.

Easter Challenge

Exploring: New life and new hope

The Easter story has many parallels to the new life we see in Spring, and the hope that it brings. Have a look around your garden or take your grown up for a walk and see how many different things you can see that demonstrate new life.

If you're stuck inside this could even be done by looking out of the window. - Look for any new flowers or plants that have appeared? - Look carefully at trees or shrubs for buds or new shoots. - Notice how some plants die right back in the winter in order to come to life again in Spring.

Think about what might be underground and yet to appear. - Take a moment to watch and listen for butterflies, bees and birds—which ones can you identify?

Creating: Easter Garden

Create an Easter scene in a part of your garden. You could make a cross out of twigs, and find a roundish stone to use for the tomb, maybe even make a cave with some soil or a small plant pot.Try adding to it other things (e.g. a path of small stones, some small flowers or moss). Alternatively this could be done in a seed tray or other plastic container part filled with soil (ideally with a couple of small holes in the bottom).

Twig crosses - Go for a walk in a wood as a family and collect lots of thin twigs (these can be found on the ground, instead of snapping them off trees). Take them home (dry them if they are wet) and



snap or cut them into two different sizes to make the main stem of the cross and the cross section. Then bind them together in a cross shape using string or wool. These can be used as a door front decoration during lent or at Easter. Or you could give them to family and friends to remind them of what Easter means.

Coin Crosses - Collect as many coins as you can find. Then use the coins to make lots of different shapes, designs and sizes of crosses. These can be photographed to have a record of the different designs. The final cross can be joining all the coins together to make a massive cross. When you have finished this activity you could collect all the coins up and give them to a local charity.

Tissue paper crosses - You will need: ● A4 paper ● A marker pen ● PVA glue or a glue stick ● Coloured tissue paper ● Scissors

On the A4 paper draw a cross shape, then put a thin layer of glue in the cross shape. Cut up or rip up bits of the tissue paper and scrunch it up. Then stick it on the cross until it is full. When the glue is dry you can cut the cross shape out.

Set yourself a challenge – see how many crosses you can find around your home, in a window or door frame, or when you're on a walk, perhaps on a gate or the branches of a tree.

Set yourself a challenge - Easter starts with Jesus spending 40 days – and nights – in the wilderness, a place like a desert.

See if you can do forty acts of kindness in the run up to Easter day. It could be helping with the washing up, or carrying in the shopping. Making a cuppa or helping to cook the dinner. Sending a card to cheer up someone who lives on their own.....

The possibilities are endless.

Write each one down, and then look back on all you've done. You'll get a lovely fuzzy feeling Inside!
